

CMB's, Defusings and CISD: How and When To Use

A Critical Incident is any event that has the power to disrupt an individual's or group's ability to cope on a temporary basis. This can include events like violence in the workplace, accidental death, suicide, murder or other particularly difficult events. By definition, they are disruptive to the organization. Three of the primary group methods to work with individuals after a Critical Incident are Crisis Management Briefings (CMB), Defusings and Critical Incident Debriefings (CISD).

This one day seminar focuses on the steps in all three models and gives instruction on when each is appropriate.

This training is open to anyone who wishes to learn more about intervening after traumatic events and developing protocols to best handle the aftermath of difficult situations within their organization.

Course Objectives:

Participants who complete this course will be able to:

1. list 6 of the common aftereffects of a traumatic situation
2. list 3 implications of using a particular approach to any situation
3. demonstrate and practice, through small group activities, the appropriate responses to traumatic events

Learning Materials:

The instructor will supply handouts of the PowerPoint presentation used in this course. Lecture and discussion will be the main learning activities, along with the use extensive of small group activities.

Evaluation:
